- A dark, greenish sky
- Large hail
- Low-lying, rotating clouds
- A loud roar, similar to a freight train

## Make Your Home Tornado-Ready

Have your roof inspected – and **upgrade to high-performance shingles** if necessary.

In hail-prone areas, consider upgrading to steel gutters and downspouts.

Install a wind-rated garage door, or brace your current door. UEARN MORE


Trim trees and shrubs.

Replace gravel/rock landscaping with shredded bark.

Develop a **family communication plan**, and practice tornado drills.

# If Severe Weather Is Coming



Bring loose items like outdoor furniture, trash Ensure gutters are clear of debris.

Protect all important documents in a safe, dry container.

Keep your **cellphone and other electronic devices** adequately charged, and have a backup battery.

**Park your car** in a safe location.



Follow NOAA's Storm Prediction Center on social media, and tune in to local news.



Turn off utilities, including natural



gas or propane, to avoid a fire.

If you must evacuate, take your emergency supplies and important documents; let loved

ones know where you plan to go.



## During the Storm If You're Indoors

**Leash pets** or place them in a carrier and keep them with you.





Because lightning can enter a building through pipes or wires, **avoid contact with anything that conducts electricity.** 



Monitor local news and weather.

**Use a flashlight** – not candles! – during a power outage.





**Place infants** and young children in car seats.

Take cover in a basement, cellar or an interior room on the lowest floor and avoid windows.



### If You're Driving



Solution of the closest shelter, if it's safe to do so.

If You're Stranded



**If debris hits your vehicle**, pull over and park.



If you can't make it to a building, **stay in the car** with your seat belt on and cover your head.





Get lower than the level
of the roadway – lie flat
in a ditch and cover your
head with your arms.

**Don't seek shelter under an overpass or bridge.** This also applies if you're stranded outside.

### After the Storm

Report serious structural damage, downed power lines and gas leaks to local officials.

If you evacuated, **return home** only when authorities say it's safe.



**Restock** your emergency supplies.





Leave if you smell gas. Otherwise, stay indoors until emergency personnel announce an all-clear.


